This Week's truth

Jesus is our Promised Rescuer!

Read & Remember

Find a comfortable place together and read aloud pages 144-151

- What was Isaiah's job? He was a prophet
- What does a prophet do? He tells people exactly what God is saying
- Who was God going to send? A King who would rescue his people
- What were the people supposed to do? Watch and listen for this coming King and Rescuer
- Did the people listen to what Isaiah had to say? No

Jesus in the Story

Say: "Even though God's people did not listen to Isaiah, God did send a king. His name was Jesus and He healed the blind. He healed the sick. He is the Good Shepherd. His name is Jesus!

What did we discover about God/Jesus from today's story? Some examples: Jesus is our Promised Rescuer. God sent Jesus.

Pray Together

Pray aloud, using the ACTS (Adoration Confession Thanksgiving Supplication) method together. "You are our God who heals our sin! Thank you we do not need to do anything for you to heal our sin, it is a free gift. Help us to trust you!"

Sing

Worship should be a prominent part of our family discipleship. Play a familiar worship song or teach your child a hymn to incorporate into family worship. You may find worship songs we sing and our worship guide at firstirving.org/worship.

Memory Verse

The verse we are currently memorizing is such a strategic verse for understanding the gospel. Our verse to memorize comes from the book of Isaiah. We are going to learn more about Isaiah next week, but his words tell us about how we are saved. Isaiah 53:6 — "The Lord has laid on him the sin of us all." I encourage you to continue teaching your child this verse this week. Explain to them what sin is (disobeying God) and that the "him" in the verse is Jesus.
